Posting and advertising of this meeting was done in compliance with Utah's Open Meetings Act and State budget requirements. Assistant Manager White verified that the recorder was on; no conflicts of interest were declared.

2. **2017 Joint Notice of Proposed Boundary Adjustment and Public Hearing for the Salt Lake City and Magna Mosquito Abatement Districts:**
  - Explanation of Proposed Boundary Adjustments:

Manager Faraji recapped the reasons for this meeting, explained how the SLCMAD's taxing boundaries were the same as Salt Lake City's actual city boundaries in 1923. Salt Lake City has grown, as have the areas receiving mosquito abatement services from SLCMAD. However, the taxing boundary of SLCMAD has remained the same as in 1923. Magna Mosquito Abatement District was created in 1946, and current Salt Lake City limits have now expanded into a

portion of MMAD's service area. The overlap has not been an area of concern until now. Increased commerce will soon be developed due to the new prison construction. SLCMAD will be handling mosquito control around the new prison and would like to receive tax dollars from the impending expanded growth in that area.

Certified tax rates will cause the tax dollars received by SLCMAD and MMAD to remain unchanged. Therefore, SLCMAD's annexation will not lower MMAD's tax revenue in any way. SLCMAD is willing to take on the financial challenges of controlling the additional area without receiving an increase in tax revenues because it will become advantageous in the near future.

- Board Discussion:


A lengthy discussion was not required because the Magna Mosquito Abatement Board Members were aware of the boundary conflict and had previously approved the "Joint Resolution of the SLCMAD and the Magna Mosquito Abatement District Declaring an Intent to Adjust Common Boundaries" at their 5 July 2017 Board Meeting. The MMAD's Board of Trustees are in agreement with how the new boundary line between MMAD and SLCMAD will be modified. The SLCMAD approved the same joint resolution at SLCMAD's 20 July 2017 Board Meeting. The required public notices and 60-day waiting period have sufficiently been met.

### 3. Adjourn:


